# **1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

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## **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

The Concept of Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College is based on the ancient Indian Education system founded on Gurukul System.

Sharda Education Society's Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College was established in the year 2014 to promote the noble cause of spreading higher education among the working youth of Thane city and its surrounding areas. Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College is the first night degree college in Thane city to provide professional development courses like BBI, B.Sc. (IT), BAF and BMS for the working students. The College functions on the objective of "Earn & Learn" and works as a platform for specially those who want to complete their education along with their employment. Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College aims at providing all round development of the students through innovative teaching and effective activities. The college operates under the aegis of the Sharda Education Society.

The Society started its academic services by establishing a primary school, which subsequently led to the establishment of a Junior college. To cater to the higher education needs of the locals, the Trust took a bold step to establish a Night Degree College, which was later extended to the establishment of a Law College. This gradual progression in last two decades is in perfect tune with the vision and mission of the institution.

The college was established in the year 2014 by a team of educationists with only three programs, viz., Bachelors of Commerce (Accounting & Finance), Bachelors of Commerce (Banking & Insurance) & Bachelors of Science (Information Technology) with only 129 students on its roll. Today, the College offers five different programmes, most of which are professional development programmes with more than 1000 students on its roll.

In order to further assist working students to access higher education along with their jobs, the College started a centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik, in the college premises in the year 2016. In addition to this, the College offers number of Certificate and Diploma courses in association with government agencies to provide job opportunities to the youth from Thane region.

The College has also been a place to create social and cultural harmony by its social services channeled through National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC). With its well-equipped infrastructure the college has been a place for effective development of students. The college has always been a helping hand to the deprived and a place to learn and develop skills through its team of dedicated teachers and non-teaching staff.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

- The institution follows the curriculum designed by the Board of Studies (BoS) of the respective courses of the University of Mumbai.
- The institutional Academic Calendar is co-terminus with the Academic Calendar of the affiliating University.
- The College ensures completion of 180 days teaching in a year and the results of college level examinations are declared in 45 days as per University ordinances.
- Teachers' workload and time-table are based on the guidelines of the Government of Maharashtra and the UGC.
- Teachers prepare lecture plans and write daily report in Teacher's Diary on day-to-day basis.
- Students are oriented about the syllabus and evaluation pattern and various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- Teachers use student-centric methods like power point presentations, field visits, quiz competitions, debates, etc. to make teaching-learning process effective.
- Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) is conducted as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai.
- Although the number of failures in examinations is very less, the College conducts remedial coaching for weak students.
- The College offers Certificate Course in Nursing, Certificate Course in General Nursing & Midwifery Assistant and Diploma Course in Medical Lab Technician in association with Maharashtra State Board of Skill Development (MSBSD).
- The College also offers Diploma in Fire Service Engineering, Advance Diploma in Fire Safety Engineering and Advance Diploma in Industrial Safety in association with Maharashtra State Board of Technical Education (MSBTE).
- Choice-based Credit System (CBCS) has been implemented for all programmes as per the University guidelines.
- Various cross-cutting issues relevant to gender equity, professional ethics, human values and environment and sustainability have been included in the Curriculum.

- Guest lectures and workshops on various issues covered in curriculum are conducted for the benefit of students.
- Attendance of the students is monitored and defaulters' lists are prepared and displayed and parents are conveyed about the deficiencies.
- Mentoring as per the UGC guidelines is practiced for all programmes and records are maintained.
- Teachers participate in assessment process of the University. Teachers have also been contributing to Question Banks for Online Examinations conducted during COVID-19.
- Feedback on Syllabus and Course Contents is collected, analysed and action taken report is submitted to the BoS, University of Mumbai.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

- The average enrollment for the preceding 5 years for all programmes taken together is about 76.76%.
- The proportion of students belonging to various reserved categories like SC, ST and OBC is as per the seats statutorily reserved for them in the educational institutions.
- The institution assesses the learning levels of students at the entry level on the basis of their performance at the qualifying examination.
- The students' performance is monitored continuously on the basis of their attendance, class participation and performance in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE).
- Class Test, Assignments and Project Work form an integral parts of the teaching-learning process.
- The students to full-time ratio is 58.06:1. 94.12% of the teachers' posts approved by the Management are filled with full-time staff.
- The College has low teachers turnover and high retention rate in comparison to other self financed colleges due to positive work culture and empathetic management.
- Teachers make use of Experiential Learning, Participative Learning and Problem Solving Methodologies as per the University Guidelines.
- Teachers make extensive use of ICT in teaching-learning process in the class room having ICT facility. 40% of the classrooms have ICT facility.
- Internal assessment is conducted as per the University guidelines in a transparent manner by the Examination Committee headed by the Principal.
- There are no examination related grievances during the last five years. The Examination Committee is authorized to deal with them as per the University guidelines.
- Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) have been clearly stated and displayed and their outcomes are analysed on the conclusion of the Academic Year.
- The average pass percentage during the last five years stood at about 91.52%, which is higher than the University average.
- Students Satisfaction Survey (SSS) has been conducted and the report of the same has been made available on the College website.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

- Being an undergraduate institution operating purely on self-financed basis with limited financial resources, the inclination of adhoc staff is limited towards research.
- The Research Committee organizes workshop on various research issues to encourage teachers and students to engage in research activities.
- 2 teachers have presented research papers in various national and international conferences and the same

have been published in ISSN journals.

- 1 teacher has been a co-author for a book titled 'Auditing' published by Himalaya Publishing House.
- The College does not receive any grant from Government or any non-government agency for the promotion of research activities.
- One teacher has successfully completed Ph.D. and 3 teachers are pursuing their Ph.D. from the UGC recognized universities.
- The College provides library facility and computer centre facility to students for compulsory research based projects in their respective subjects.
- NSS Volunteers and NCC Cadets undertake a number of extension activities such as tree plantation drive, beach cleaning, blood donation camp, cleanliness drive, annual rural camps, etc
- The College has adopted villages named Nashera and Khodala (Dist. Thane) for undertaking several developmental and extension activities during the annual rural camp.
- The College has one unit of NSS consisting 50 students and NCC unit (girls) consisting of 50 students.
- The College has 7 MOUs with Reliable Academy, Unique Academy. Dnyan Ganga Educational Trust's Degree College of Science and Commerce, Thane, Eknath B. Madhvi College, Thane Industries Small Scale Association (TISSA) and Anudip Foundation for Social Welfare for faculty and students exchange and organizing collaborative quality enhancement activities.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

- The College has excellent infrastructure spread over a campus of 0.23 acres in the heart of the fast developing city of Thane.
- The College building is five storied with a total built up area of 2267.08 sq. meters. The college ground is spacious enough to provides adequate space for organising several students oriented activities.
- There are in all 17 spacious classrooms. All classrooms are well ventilated with necessary infrastructure.
- Of these 17 classrooms, 4 classrooms have smart boards and 3 have a facility of projector, making teaching learning process effective.
- There are two Information Technology (IT) Labs in the College, which are being used by students for computer practicals.
- The College library is partially automated with 5801 books. The College subscribes to several journals, magazines and newspapers.
- The average footfalls in the library is 1.4 teachers and 4.79 for students per day as per the library entry records for the year 2021-2022.
- There is a facility of indoor games such as chess and carom and outdoor games such as badminton, cricket, football, shot-put, etc.
- Students have been provided a facility of Turf and Gymnasium in the sister institution of the college located in the vicinity.
- The College hires TMC playground near the college, which is spread over 4500 sq. meter area for outdoor sports like cricket, kho-kho, kabbadi, dodge ball, langdi, badminton, volley ball, box cricket, football, handball, tug-of-war, running, shot put, disc throw, etc.
- The College has a MOU with Thorve Enterprises for a period of 10 years for provision and maintenance of IT resources. The MOU aims at provision of the latest and proper maintenance of IT resources by an expert organisation without much capital investment.
- The College has 50 Computers, 8 printers, 3 photocopiers, 3 projectors and two sound systems.
- The College has hi-speed internet connection of 50 mbps speed. The same are being used for wi-fi connectivity on the college premises at selected places.
- The infrastructure of the college is well maintained and the system for the maintenance of physical and

IT resources of the college is in place.

### **Student Support and Progression**

- Students are given freeships and scholarships from the Social Welfare Department of the State Government.
- The College Trust provides freeship to needy students on case-to-case basis. All such cases are referred to the Hon. Secretary, who takes his decisions in the matter.
- The College has conducted several skill enhancement programmes related to soft skills, communication skills, yoga, health and hygiene and ICT and computing skills.
- Career Counseling Cell acts as a link between the talent seekers and job seekers. It connects industry people looking to hire fresh talents in the legal field.
- Career Counseling Cell also invites experts from various private agencies to guide students on competitive examinations and careers in various sectors.
- The institution has Anti-ragging Cell, Internal Complaint Committee and Grievance Redressal Committee. There has been no serious grievance during the last five years.
- As per the records available with the college, 6.58% of the students graduating from the institution have progressed to higher education or have been placed in jobs.
- The College organizes Annual Day (Anandostavr) to give a vent to various talents among the students. Annual Sports Day is organized to bring about physical development of the students.
- Students have been represented in various committees such as Students Council, IQAC, Grievance Redressal Committee, Sports Committee, Cultural Committee, Cell for PWD and SC and ST Welfare and so on.
- The Alumni Association of the College has been recently registered. The members of the Alumni Association guide students, train the mentors and donate in kind for the development of the institution.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

- The College functions on the objective of "Earn & Learn" and works as a platform for specially those who want to complete their education along with their employment.
- The 'Vision' and 'Mission' of the College are reflected in every activity and action of the Management and the College.
- To cater to the higher education needs of locals, the Society started distance education programmes of YCMOU in the year 2015.
- The society believes in the principles of decentralization and participative management. The Principal is the academic, administrative and financial head of the College.
- The Principal plans and implements various administrative and co-curricular and extra-curricular activities with the help of various committees, which consist of members from teaching staff, non-teaching staff and student's representatives.

- All major financial decisions pertaining to infrastructure development are taken in meetings of College Development Committee (CDC).
- The day-to-day activities of the College are planned and reflected in the Academic Calendar. Teachers prepare lecture plans and write Teacher's Diary on daily basis.
- The College Development Committee (CDC) has approved a Perspective Plan (2023-27), which is displayed on the College website.
- The College makes use of e-governance in administration, finance and accounts, students' admission and support and examinations.
- The Society treats its teaching and non-teaching staff as a family. The Society celebrates the birthday of all its employees.
- The Society provides financial assistance to teachers for attending conferences and seminars and publishing research papers.
- Institutional organogram has been made available on the College website and is adhered to for various policy decisions.
- Salary of teaching and non-teaching staff is credited before seventh of every month. Provident Fund (PF) facility is made available to staff working with the institution for five or more years.
- Best Teacher's award is given every year by the Society. Class IV employees are provided two pairs of uniform every year.
- Non-teaching staff is provided with shoes, umbrella and raincoat during rainy season every year.
- Teachers performance is evaluated on the basis of their Confidential Reports and daily dairy and feedback generated from students.
- The accounts of the College are audited every year by an external auditor. The accounts of the College and Trust have been audited up to F.Y. 2021-22. There are no audit objections.
- The IQAC was established in the College during the month of July, 2018 and the first task that the IQAC took in hand was to get the institute accredited.
- The IQAC has conducted several meetings and has streamlined various documents. Feedback is collected, analysed and action taken report is submitted to the BoS, University of Mumbai.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

- The College has constituted Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) and has established Women Development Cell (WDC) to safeguard female students and teachers.
- The ICC has not received any complaint. The WDC organises a number of workshops on health and hygiene and women safety for the welfare of female students and teachers.
- The College has Girls' Common Room, CCTV Surveillance in Campus and Building and Security at the Entry Gate for safety and security of women.
- Gender Audit has been conducted by an independent women social worker and suggestions given in the report are being implemented.
- Traditional bulbs and tube lights are being replaced with LED ones. At present, 100% of bulbs and lights in premises are LED. Star-rated electrical appliances are being encouraged.
- There is an effective Two Bin System for the management of solid wastes. Liquid waste is safely discharged through liquid waste management system of the Corporation.
- E-waste is handed over to the licensed e-waste buyer by Thorve Enterprises, the IT service provider. Papers are used on both sides and envelopes are reused by pasting a paper slip on addresses.
- The region has a good ground water system. The water received from Corporation is stored in one ground level water tanks and one overhead storage water tank, from where it is supplied to the College building.

- Outside vehicles are not permitted in the campus. The premises is plastic free. The College premises has a total of 65 small plants and trees which add to its beauty.
- Green Audit and Energy Audit have been conducted by the experts and suggestions made by the experts have been taken into consideration.
- Adult students are encouraged to register for voters' card as per the directives of the Election Commission of India.
- The College celebrates the state, national and international commemorative days and events.
- The simplicity in every activity with high performance standards makes the institution unique in the region.

The College Trust has also established Anand Vishwa Gurukul College of Law at Dharmaveer Nagar in the vicinity of the College. Therefore, the College is well prepared to offer multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary programmes in Law, Science, Commerce and Managements fields as Major and Minor components under the National Education Policy, 2020. The College is situated in the fast developing Thane region in the vicinity of Mumbai city, which is developing rapidly in terms of industry, commercial centres and infrastructure offering innumerable opportunities for introducing new multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary courses in collaboration with industry. Industrial and commercial developments in the region will provide opportunity to the College to avail necessary teaching staff for new courses as per the National Education Policy, 2020. The College is well aware that ABC Framework is the core of the National Education Policy and therefore, several awareness sessions have been conducted to orient students about ABC mechanism and its registration process. Almost 80% of the College students have already downloaded digilocker and registered on the ABC portal. The College has set up a helpdesk for registering students on ABC portal and the remaining students are being registered on the portal along with their admissions for the academic year 2023-2024.</p>

Skill development:</p>	<p>Skill development as per the National Skill Qualifications Framework (NSQF) is an essential component of higher education system, as it helps students develop the practical skills they need to succeed in their careers. The College offers several certificate courses, diploma courses and advanced diploma courses in association with the recognised bodies of the government to develop employment skills and provide job opportunities to the students. Under the NEP framework, the College proposes to offer specialized training programmes in the fields of Banking, Accountancy, Insurance, Advertising, Logistics, Supply Chain, E-commerce and so on to develop soft skills and technical skills of students. These courses can help students develop highly sought-after skills that are relevant to specific industries. The College also proposes to develop entrepreneurial skills of Commerce graduates to promote new start-ups in the field. Marathi, Hindi, Sanskrit and Spoken English to its students. The ancient Indian education system has made significant contributions to various branches of knowledge. Some of the examples of the same are:

- (7) Risk Management: The ancient Indian education system recognized the importance of risk management in financial transactions. It taught strategies for mitigating risks associated with lending, investment, and trade. It is important to note that these contributions from the ancient Indian education system laid the foundation for modern practices in commerce, banking, and finance. While contemporary knowledge and practices have evolved significantly, the roots of many concepts can be traced back to the rich heritage of ancient Indian education and intellectual contributions. The College will include these contributions to the compulsory course in Indian Knowledge System of 2 credits under the New

#### 1. Curriculum Planning:

- Teachers attend **workshops** conducted by the Board of Studies of the University on **syllabus revision and examination reforms**.

#### 2. Curriculum Delivery:

#### Response:

Being an affiliated College, the Course Curriculum for all courses is formulated by the Board of Studies of respective course of the University of Mumbai. The Board of Studies (BoS) for various courses have integrated cross-cutting issues related to professional ethics, gender equality, human values, environment protection and sustainability in formal curriculum of the courses in order to bring about all round development of the students. These issues have been addressed in the various courses as described below:

- 1. Professional Ethics:** Professional Ethics is concerned with the maintenance of high ethical and moral standards that govern a profession and its members. Courses such as **Business Communication (F.Y.BBI), Organizational Behaviour (S.Y.BBI), Entrepreneurship Management (S.Y.BBI), Financial Reporting & Analysis (T.Y.BBI), Strategic Management (T.Y.BBI), Business Ethics and Corporate Governance (T.Y.BBI), Business Communication (F.Y.BAF), Business Environment (F.Y.BAF), Auditing (S.Y.BAF), Technical Communication Skills (F.Y.B.Sc. IT), Business Communication (F.Y.B.Com.), Advertising (S.Y.B.Com.), Financial Accountancy & Auditing (T.Y.B.Com.), Business Communication (F.Y.BMS), Integrated Marketing Communication (S.Y.BMS), Foundation Course (S.Y.B.MS), Financial Accounting (T.Y.BMS), Sales and Distribution Management (T.Y.BMS), Customer Relationship Management (T.Y.BMS), Retail Management (T.Y.BMS) and Marketing of Non-profit Organisations (T.Y.BMS).**
- 2. Gender Equity:** Gender equality means treating all genders with fairness and equity with any discrimination. Courses like **Foundation Course (F.Y. & S.Y. for all programmes)** which is a compulsory course for all programmes, **Business Communication (F.Y.BAF) and Business Planning and Entrepreneurial Management (S.Y.BMS)** expose students to the importance of treating all genders fairly. In addition to that, **Women Development Cell (WDC)** undertakes various activities to sensitize students towards gender equality and role of women in society.
- 3. Human Values:** Human values are virtues that guide human behavior. Some of the human values that are integrated into the curriculum are Equality Justice, Accountability, Transparency, Honesty, Responsibility, Respect for Diversity in Religion, Culture, Gender Equity, etc. Courses

like **Organisational Behaviour (S.Y.BBI)**, **Business Ethics and Corporate Governance (T.Y.BBI)**, **Foundation Course (S.Y.BAF)** and **Foundation Course (S.Y.B.Com.)** inculcate these values in the learners.

4. **Environment and Sustainability:** Many courses focus on the environmental and sustainability aspect as it is one of most challenging issues facing mankind. **Courses like Business Environment (F.Y.BAF), Foundation Course (F.Y. and S.Y. all programmes), Green IT (F.Y.B.Sc. IT) and Environmental Studies – I and II (F.Y.B.Com.)** focus on these issues. ### 2.3.1

**Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process**

**Response:**

The institution makes use of various student-centric methods as per the University Guidelines to improve learning outcomes.

### **Experiential Learning:**

1. **Business Communication Paper I and II:** Business Communication is a common paper for all programmes (except for B.Sc. IT) which mainly focuses on developing communication skills of students from business and commercial perspective. Large-sized classes are divided into small batches of 20 to 25 students per batch. Tutorials focus more on practical aspects of the subject.
  - **Paper I:** Practical assignments include writing business letters and email, writing Statement of Purpose, Job Application, Resume, Job Acceptance Letter and Letter of Resignation and Developing an Idea and Drafting a Report.
  - **Paper II :** Practical assignments include preparing presentation using OHP, transparencies and PPT, mock interview, drafting business letters such as placing an order, seeking status inquiry, filing trade complaints and seeking redressal and drafting application under RTI Act.
2. **Mathematics and Statistics:** Mathematics and Statistics is the another compulsory paper across all programmes at the first year level. The paper focuses on developing mathematical abilities of students from commercial perspective and also analytical abilities from research perspective. Again, students here are divided into small batches so as to impart special training to students from practical perspective.
  - **Paper I:** Five practical assignments on Shares and Mutual Funds, Permutation and Combination, Summarization Measures, Elementary Probability and Decision Theory.
  - **Paper II :** Five practical assignments on Derivatives and their Applications, Interest and Annuity, Linear Correlation and Regression, Time Series Analysis and Index Numbers and Elementary Probability Distribution.

**These assignments are discussed and solved by students in tutorials in the presence of teacher. Teacher assists students in case of difficulties.**

### **Participative Learning:**

1. **Foundation Course Paper I and II:** Project work for 25 marks on various social issues such as Substance Abuse – Impact on Youth, HIV/AIDS – Awareness, Prevention, Treatment, Problems of the Elderly, Issue of Child Labour, Child Abuse and Trafficking of Women is given.
2. **Foundation Course Paper III and IV:** Project work for 25 marks on Impact of Disasters on Human Life, Local Case Studies of Environmental Disasters, Human Right Issues in Disaster Management, Rights of Consumers, Inter-relations between Science and technology, RTI Act, Consumer Protections Act , Importance of Self-awareness, Leadership Skills is given.

**Students are encouraged to undertake survey and collect and analyze outcomes on the basis of data so collected.**

### **Problem Solving Methodologies:**

1. **Practicals for B.Sc. (IT) Programme:** Project work of 25 marks is a compulsory components of B.Sc. (IT) programme. Some of the hands-on problem solving methodologies for B.Sc. (IT) students are Advance Java, Linux, ASP, Net Technology, IOT, Business intelligence to build huge dashboards for big data, GIS, Cyber law and Android Mobile Programming.
2. **Research Based Project Work:** All undergraduate programmes have a compulsory field based project of 100 marks in semester VI. Students are asked to identify any problem and frame problem statement. They are guided to formulate objectives and hypothesis. A survey is a compulsory element of the project work. Students collect primary data and analyze and interpret the outcomes with the help of guiding teachers. Oral viva is conducted by an external expert as a part of evaluation of the project work.

In addition to that the College staff makes use of **ICT in teaching-learning process**. **Field visits** to industries are also conducted to give a practical exposure to students.

## 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1

**Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient**

**Response:**

Being an affiliated college, the framework of internal and external examination is decided by the University and implemented by the College. The College strictly adheres to various circulars and notices issued by the University in this regard.

**Mechanism for Ensuring Transparency in Internal Examinations:**

The internal assessment at the College level is governed by the rules and regulations specified by the University of Mumbai in its Ordinance No. 4.102.

- All internal tests are conducted as per the University Guidelines by the Examination Committee. The attendance and class participation of students is monitored and accordingly marks are awarded to the students.
- Individual teachers have been instructed to deal with grievances related to the internal examinations at their individual level. The College has not received any grievance regarding

internal examinations during the assessment period.

### **Mechanism for Ensuring Transparency in External Examinations:**

First and Second Year Examinations for all programmes are conducted by the College on behalf of the University. Third Year Examination for all programmes are conducted by the University. Some measures for ensuring transparency in external examinations:

- **Examination Committee:** Examination Committees, consisting of senior teachers and the Principal as the Chief Conductor, are constituted for all examinations.
- **Three Sets of Question Paper:** Three sets of question papers are submitted in sealed envelope to the Committee, from which one is randomly selected by the Chief Conductor.
- **Online Transmission of Question Paper:** Question Papers for the University conducted examinations are made available to colleges just one hour before the examination for printing through an online interface of the University.

### **Mechanism for Ensuring Transparency in Assessment:**

Some measures for ensuring transparency in assessment both at college as well as university level examinations:

- **Masking and Coding:** Answer Books of the College level examinations are masked and coded, so as to maintain confidentiality and ensure transparency in assessment.
- **Centralised Assessment:** Answer books of College level examinations are centrally assessed in the College premises under the Central Assessment Programme (CAP).
- **Online Screen-based Marking (OSM) System:** Answer books of University Level exams are scanned and assessed by the registered examiners online from the designated online assessment centres.

### **Moderation of Answer Books:**

The answer books assessed by the examiners are moderated as per the University Circular No. Exam/CAP/604/2015 dated 09.04.2015. There is a system of 100% moderation of answer papers of students who fail examination by 10% of the total marks and those who secure more than 60% of the total marks in any course. From the remaining answer books, i.e. those securing marks between 41% to 59%, 10% of the assessed answer papers are moderated.

### **Redressal of Grievances:**

All grievances related to the Internal and External Examination are dealt with in fair, transparent and

time-bound manner as per the University Circular No. Exam/Photo&Rev./College/VCD/4636-A of 2010 dated 05.04.2010.

- **Photocopy:** A student is provided with a photocopy of his assessed answer book on demand within stipulated time period.
- **Revaluation:** A student can also apply for revaluation. The original marks are masked, and the paper is re-evaluated. If there is deviation of more than 10% in re-assessment, then the candidate is awarded the revised mark.

A student may apply for both a photocopy of assessed answer book and its revaluation.

### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

**Response:**

Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College has created an eco-system for innovations and has taken a number of initiatives for transfer of knowledge.

**Eco-system for Innovations:**

- 1. Library:** The College library is well-equipped with books, and newspapers to meet the learning needs of various courses related to undergraduate programmes under the faculty of Commerce and Science offered by the College. The College has a total of 5801 books and subscribes to 17 magazines, 1 periodical and 8 newspapers. The library is partially automated. The College makes use of e-granthalaya version 3.0 for library data management. The seating capacity of reading hall is 30. The library provides references for project work to student and thereby contribute to knowledge creation.
- 2. Computer Lab Facility:** The College has two computer labs with 32 and 15 computers respectively. The students make use of computer labs for data collection and preparing report of

field based project, which is a compulsory part of the course curriculum of all self-financed courses. The practice in research projects at the undergraduate level assists students in their future research endeavours.

3. **Students Projects:** Students undertake Project Work for all self-financed programmes at final year level for 100 marks. Survey is an essential part of these projects. Students study theoretical aspects of research in Sem. V and work on projects throughout the year. Each student is allotted a guide under whose supervision such projects are prepared. Submission of project is followed by viva conducted by an external referee. All these efforts on the part of students prepare researchers for future.
4. **Research Committee:** Considering the growing significance of research in higher education sector, the College has constituted Research Committee from A.Y. 2021-2022. The main work of the committee is to organize workshops on issues related to research, encourage teachers to write research papers and engage into research activities. The College has conducted the following workshops on Research:

- Guidance Session on 'Research Methodology'
- Workshop on 'Intellectual Property Rights'

#### **Transfer of Knowledge:**

1. The College teachers are encouraged to write and publish research papers. A total of 02 research papers have been published by college teachers.
2. Some of the good research projects prepared by PG students are stored in library for reference for other students.
3. This facilitates transfer of knowledge from teachers to society at large and from students to other students.

#### **Entrepreneurship Development:**

1. The College organizes workshops on entrepreneurship development to encourage students to take up start-ups.

**Best Practice – 1**

**Title of the Practice:**

Education based on “Earn and Learn” Concept

**Objectives of the Practice:**

Established in the year 2014, Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College is the first night degree college offering professional courses such as BBI, BAF, B.Sc.(IT) and BMS for working youth in Thane city and its surrounding areas. The College was founded with the following objectives:

- 1.To provide educational opportunities for individuals who may not be able to attend day time classes due to work or other commitments, thereby increasing access to higher education.
- 2.To offer career-oriented and job-oriented programmes to working students so that they may be able to upgrade their job positions over a period of time along with their educational upgradation.
- 3.To make contribution of the national objectives of increasing Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) at the higher education level by providing higher educational opportunities to working individuals.

**The Context:**

The College was founded in the year 2014 with an objective of providing higher education to working youth with only 3 UG programmes. Later in the year 2016, the College sought approval for 2 more professional development programmes.

In addition to various university affiliated programmes, the College also offers number of certificate programmes, many of which are job-oriented to give better job prospects to aspiring students.

**The Practice:**

Realizing that most of the youth from Thane city prefer to join remunerative work after completing higher secondary education and there is no higher education institution in the city of Thane, Sharda Education Society submitted a proposal for starting a night degree college in the city.

- 1.The proposal received an approval from the Government and the College saw light of the day in the year 2014 with 3 UG programmes. Considering the demand from students, the College started 2 more UG programmes in the year 2016.
- 2.The College starts its lectures at 4.30 p.m., which end at 9.00 p.m.
- 3.Due to poor economic situations, the students prefer to attend regular lectures.
- 4.The College also provides UG programmes affiliated to Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University (YCMOU).
- 5.Job-oriented certificate and diploma courses are offered for developing employability skills of students and provide them better job opportunities.

**Evidence of Success:**

The concept of night Degree College offering professional development programme was a grand success as evident from the following facts:

1. Enrollment ratio for during the last five years is 76.76%, which is satisfactory.
2. Success ratio of the College students during the last five years is 91.52%, which is much higher than the average results of the University.
3. The average attendance in class ranges between 60% to 70%, which indicates the desire of students to learn and progress.
4. The Society provides scholarships/freeships to needy students on the basis of request received from them.
5. The College offers a number of job-oriented certificate and diploma programmes which have good response from the students.

### **Problems Encountered:**

Starting a new college in growing urban areas like Thane was a challenge. But it was the determination of the Society to establish a college for the welfare of working youth in the city. The Society sought help from experts from education field and professionals from local areas and their collective efforts and hard work bore fruits, when the College received approval from the Government for the establishment of the first night degree college offering professional development programmes in Thane city.

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### **Best Practice – 2**

#### **Title of the Practice:**

Professional Development of Students through Job Oriented Certificate and Diploma Courses

#### **Objectives of the Practice:**

One of the objectives of the NEP is to enhance employability for students and the College strongly believes in providing necessary support to working students to enhance their employability and give them opportunities for career progression. From this perspective, the College offers several certificate and diploma programme, which are in demand among students. Since these programmes are directly related to development of specific skills among students, they have higher employment potentials.

#### **The Context:**

However, with the success of courses over a period of time, the flow of students towards these courses has increased naturally.

**Response:**

**Institutional Distinctiveness**

Sharda Education Society's Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College was established in the year 2014 with a mission to enrich students from Thane region with endowment of knowledge for strong socio-economic progression. Thane is an industrial city located in the vicinity of Mumbai. Thane city and its surrounding areas were mainly inhibited by population belonging to underprivileged socio-economic backgrounds. However, during the last two decades there has been drastic transformation in the socio-economic profile of the region. One of the impacts of this transformation is the rising demand of higher educational institution in the region. Since most of the population in the region belongs to poor economic background, young boys prefer to work post their higher secondary education and many of them are deprived of high education. Sharda Education Society founded senior night college with a view to bring such children to formal higher education system by starting the first night degree college offering professional courses such as BBI, BAF, B.Sc.(IT) and BMS for working youth in Thane city in the year 2014. The College has, thus, been basically founded on "Earn and Learn" concept.

Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College is affiliated to University of Mumbai and is recognized by

the Government of Maharashtra. The College offers the following programmes affiliated to the University of Mumbai.

- (1) Bachelors of Commerce
- (2). Bachelors of Commerce (Accounting & Finance)
- (3) Bachelors of Commerce (Banking & Insurance)
- (4) Bachelors of Science (Information Technology)
- (5) Bachelors of Management Studies.

In addition to the above undergraduate programmes, the College is also a recognised centre of Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University. Anand Vishwa Gurukul Senior Night College is located in the heart of Thane city. It has well ventilated and spacious classrooms which gives the feel of Gurukul environment. Of the 17 classrooms, 4 class rooms have smart boards and 3 classrooms have projector. The Society plans to install smart boards in all class rooms in near future. The College boasts of having spacious Building, Canteen and Open Air Auditorium. All Class Rooms, Corridors and Library are under the surveillance with CCTV camera. The College premises is neat, clean and well maintained.

The dedicated and devoted staff members take keen and active interest to shape career and personality of students. The staff turnover is very less in our institution due to healthy and positive work environment and empathetic approach of the Management.

The College library is well equipped with books and magazines for the benefit of students. All teachers make use of ICT in the teaching-learning process. The importance is always given to the practical approach of teaching through field visits, intra-college debate and quiz competitions and elocution competitions. Although proportion of failures in examinations is very less, the College organizes special Remedial Coaching Sessions for weak students. The advanced learners are encouraged to participate in different intercollegiate activities and to become the part of various committees. In addition to that several guest lectures and workshops are organized for the students.. As per the University rules, 75% attendance criteria is strictly followed. Since most of the students seeking admission to the College are working youth, the College pays special attention to their learning needs. The performance level of the

students is continuously monitored based on their performance in the internal examinations. This is done by evaluating them through their participation in the classroom, by looking into their performance during both Internal and External exams and by holding meetings with the parents when need arises. Our Institution ensures that the students are made aware about the curriculum through Orientation Programmes. All these efforts have positive impact on the College results, with the average pass percentage of students for the final year examination is 91.52%, which is much higher than the University average of about 60%.

The College has active NSS and NCC (Girls) unit which organize a number of extension activities such as Tree Plantation drive, Personality Development Camp, Road Safety Dries, NSS Residential Camp, Beach Cleaning Drive, Blood Donation Camp and so on. This makes students realize their innate power to contribute to society and become responsible citizens.

The NSS unit of the College organizes Annual Rural Camp at two Adivasi Talukas Nashera and Mokhada. The NSS Volunteers organizes several developmental and extension activities at these villages such as Literacy Survey, Session on Confidence Building and Social Awareness, Yoga Session, Shramdaan under Swachhata Abhiyan, Health Check-up Camp and Free Medicine Distribution, Competitions on Ad Designing and Poster-making, Bal Melava and Skit & Cloth distribution to the needy ones in the nearby areas. The Women Development Cell of our College is proactive in promoting gender equity. The WDC organizes various seminars and workshops for the empowerment of all the students, specifically female students of the college. Active participation of students in all such activities brings about their holistic development.

A number of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such as annual cultural fest and annual sports day are organised to bring about all round development of students. Students are also encouraged to participate in inter-collegiate events.

The College proposes to start PG programmes in Master of Commerce (Advanced Accountancy) and Master of Commerce (Business Management). The College also proposes to establish Research Committee with external members to strengthen research base and encourage teachers to register for Ph.D. and complete the same in stipulated time. The College also propose to sign MOUs with industry and NGOs for intership and placement of students and organisation of extension activities. Finally, the College plans to seek autonomy under the National Education Policy, 2020 to have better academic offerings for students seeking to develop their careers.
